
Persuasive Essays (expressing an opinion)

With these essays you are given ONE opinion, and then asked specifically if you agree or disagree with it. **You must make it clear whether you agree or disagree** and give your reasons why.



Persuasive Essays consist of 4 paragraphs:

<u>Paragraph 1</u>: Write an introduction where the topic and your opinion are stated clearly.

<u>Paragraph 2</u>: Present a supportive argument. Back up your argument with reasons, facts and examples.

<u>Paragraph 3</u>: Present another supportive argument. Support your opinion with reasons, facts and examples.

<u>Paragraph 4</u>: End your essay with a strong conclusion where the main points of the essay are summarized and your opinion is restated in other words.

Useful Phrases for Writing Persuasive Essays:

To express opinion:

I believe, In my opinion, I think, In my view, I strongly believe, It seems to me (that), As far as I am concerned, I am (not) convinced that..., I (firmly) believe ...

To list points:

In the first place, first of all, To begin with.

To add more points:

what is more, another major reason, also, furthermore, moreover, in addition to this/that, besides, apart from this, not to mention the fact that...

To introduce contrasting viewpoints:

It is argued that, People argue that, There are people who oppose, Contrary to what most people believe, As opposed to the above ideas...

To introduce examples:

for example, for instance, such as, in particular, especially...

To conclude:

In conclusion, To sum up, All in all, All things considered.
