Expository Essays (presenting an opinion)

With these essays you are given a topic to relate to by listing characteristics, features, and examples. It provides details about how something looks, feels, makes one feel etc. An expository essay is a writer's exposition (explaining) of a short topic, idea, or question.

HELP with Expository Essay



Expository Essays consist of 4 paragraphs:

<u>Paragraph 1</u>: Write an introduction where the topic and your opinion (and suggestions/offers etc.) are stated clearly.

<u>Paragraph 2</u>: Present a supportive argument. Back up your argument with reasons, facts and examples.

<u>Paragraph 3</u>: Present another supportive argument. Support your opinion with reasons, facts and examples.

<u>Paragraph 4</u>: End with a strong conclusion where the main points of the essay are summarized and your opinion is restated in other words.

Useful Phrases for Writing Expository Essays:

To express opinion:

The main characteristics, the most important components, I believe, In my opinion, I think, In my view, I strongly believe, It seems to me (that), As far as I am concerned, I am (not) convinced that..., I (firmly) believe ...

To list points:

In the first place, first of all, to start with, Firstly, to begin with.

To add more points:

what is more, another major reason, also, furthermore, moreover, in addition to this/that, besides, apart from this, not to mention the fact that...

To introduce examples:

for example, for instance, such as, in particular, especially...

To conclude:

In conclusion, To sum up, All in all, All things considered.

Example: A teen magazine has asked its readers what they think the qualities of a good friend are.

Write a passage for the magazine stating your opinion. Give one or two specific qualities and explain why.
